# Decoration Squad display gains community support

Pontefract's Decoration Squad, overseen by Phil Cook, Vice Chair of Pontefract Civic Society, has been busy over recent months, gathering painted bottoms from plastic bottles in order to create this fantastic display on Pontefract town hall, complete with the cypher of King Charles III.

BBC Radio Leeds - A live interview down the line for the Andrew Edwards breakfast show took place at 7:40am on Saturday 6 May in Essex, before Paul and Christine Cartwright jumped on the Tube to head into central London for the full Coronation experience.

Phil Cook said, "I'm so pleased with the community response, and of our small band of active volunteers, who have also erected a number of union flags, although we just couldn't replicate the comprehensive programme that we did for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee".

Pontefract saw other events taking place, including a screening of the Coronation by Wakefield Council at Pontefract Castle plus a Paddington film and the Windsor concert. St Giles' Church hosted an organ recital and a civic service on the Sunday afternoon, following the big day.

Paul Cartwright, Civic Society Chair, also said "the plastic bottle bottoms are recycled as best we can; in fact, some had to be taken from a former liquorice display, which now means we're collecting again, especially those painted white".

## Chair's Report

# Precinct abuse – takeaways, taxis, and opportunistic lazy drivers

Do you think these drivers should get away with it?

Do you think Wakefield MDC is doing enough to prevent this abuse?



We've been regularly monitoring the situation for years, more frequently over the past year. Recently, when part of Jubilee Way was coned off to one lane, no additional measures were put in place to prevent opportunistic drivers taking a short cut down Beastfair.

We have continued to raise this whole situation with the Council, who have said on numerous occasions that the bollards across the district were all installed at the same time, and many are failing. They are therefore looking for a replacement solution, but as it's district wide, this is costly. Throughout this lengthy saga, we have requested additional temporary signage (there's only one sign on Valley Road, which is on an exit - not an entry point), and we've asked for temporary barriers which could be manned by operatives. Nothing has been done, other than to be told that this isn't possible.

In January, Cllr Matthew Morley (Planning & Highways) promised that Pontefract would be a priority for a solution in the late summer; we've yet to hear a confirmed

date from Council officers. Meanwhile, this misuse has increased, and it will only be a matter of time before someone is injured, or even killed.

On 4 April, ClIr David Jones agreed with one of our complaint emails, and on 5 April I specified where temporary signage ought to be in place. On 19 April, West Yorkshire Police confirmed that permanent signage for issues such as this was absent across the Wakefield district, even though it was in use in neighbouring Leeds and Bradford.

I've also photographed the same signs in Stamford, where the council use temporary signage and barriers on the highway for their large weekly Friday market. If they can achieve this, why can't Wakefield MDC? The police are prepared to support enforcement, though they do not have the powers until the correct permanent signage is in place, and they raised this with the council in mid-April.

Meanwhile, we continue to take photographs, we send them to the Council, and we wait.

## The Yorkshire Society Heritage Summit

A year after we hosted the inaugural summit, Dave Hogg, Paul and Christine Cartwright headed off to Victoria Hall in Saltaire for a full day of heritage, conservation and nature for The Yorkshire Society Heritage Summit and Symposium. A lunchtime guided heritage walk was thrown in for good measure, as well as an acoustic set from a singer/guitarist, and a majestic performance of the organ as it rose from the depths of the building to appear on stage. The exhibition included 30 organisations, and around 100



delegates for the full day symposium; both statistics were double what was achieved in Pontefract, which is great for The Yorkshire Society and great networking for the region. For further details, visit https://theyorkshiresociety.org/.

#### **Civic Voice Convention**

On Friday 19 May, this event in Halifax started after lunch with a town centre tour with the Conservation Officer and Markets Manager from Calderdale Council, pointing out some grand historic Georgian and Victorian buildings including the town hall, and an art deco building.



The tour and the story of Borough Market, including the 'streets in the sky', were brought alive by the passionate Markets Manager; whilst the building is old and being conserved, it is reinventing itself with a zone for the night time economy.

On Friday night, we had an excellent dinner at the Piece Hall.

On Saturday the convention continued, being co-hosted by Halifax Civic Trust & YHACS, where we heard from Create Streets & JTP Architects on placemaking, followed by branding from Rhubarb Design House.

After lunch, it was Heritage-led Regeneration at Dean Clough, The Piece Hall, Calderdale Council on filming locations, and Page Park Architects on the revamp of Leeds town hall. For further details go to https://civicvoice.org.uk.



## **WMDC Pontefract Regeneration**

The agenda for this quarterly meeting is defined by the Civic Society, and therefore we push for debate with officers and usually a senior councillor. On this occasion we were joined by Cllr Tony Hames.

An action schedule of **regeneration projects**, large and small, was discussed after a town centre site visit by elected members, followed by our walk with the regeneration representatives earlier in 2023. All of these projects require budgets and grants to be sourced, but at least it's a start, and it's very thorough.

The indoor **Market Hall** refurbishment has commenced, which will include the two iconic Gilbert Scott designed telephone boxes at our request (key visual options for community promotions).

**WDH** will start some work on their Horsefair site in April 2024. The recently completed residential building called Neptune House (Stuart Road) hasn't been viewed by our Planning Group, nor has it been occupied.

We await further news on the future redevelopment of the **Kiko's** site.



We have raised the current state of the **Buttercross** with the council, both the flagstones and internal decoration needs work.

Conservation guidance from the local authority and Historic England for **The Counting House** (or as we prefer



to call it 'The Merchant's Warehouse') was refreshing to hear, with a completely different openness from the new owner, Guy Lister.

Sadly, there was no progress from Mid Yorkshire NHS Trust and Homes England for the **Dispensary and Hermitage**.

With four projects in two locations (Town Hall and Friarwood Valley Gardens) requiring answers from the Corporate Landlords Team (CLT), it was concerning there no one from that team present, nor was a report tabled. A CLT presence is now required at these meetings.

We are awaiting an update from **Environment/ Streetscene** on a proposal at Pontefract Castle that we'd previously put forward for the use of some surplus **wooden planters**.

On **leisure**, we sought to support a proposal from the Friends of Pontefract Park for **outdoor table tennis**, which many towns across the country now have, though this is currently being blocked by Aspire management.

**On transport**, we can report confirmed commencement dates for:

- Monkhill Station lifts and footbridge July 2023
- North Baileygate changes Autumn 2023
- Horsefair 'Streets for People' Spring 2024 Paul do these last two come under Highways rather than transport?

#### **Grants Successes**



We are fortunate to be able to support a youth project in Friarwood Valley Gardens having been awarded £500 from the

council's Capital Development Fund for an art commission and youth workshop led by Rachel List, also a plaque will also be purchased and a tree will be planted.

We're thrilled to announce that we have been awarded a Culture Grant by Wakefield Council of £975. The project is being delivered by Rhona Crichton from **Pontefract Art Club**, leading towards an art trail by schools for Liquorice Shoots and the Liquorice Festival in July. This is also supported by engagement with local businesses across Pontefract town centre.

We were also successful in in May in gaining a Culture Grant from Wakefield Council of £1,415 for our **Heritage**Open Days programme, which enables us to deliver an art and culture-themed festival for the community and visitors during September.

## **Rail Group**

We have held three regular Group meetings this year in the Town Hall. Group members join the regular on-line briefings from Northern Rail discussing timetables and operational performance.

Our continued membership of Railfuture has involved members attending and contributing to their regular Yorkshire Branch meetings, as well as their on-line webinars.

Through our meetings with officers from Wakefield Council we have been consulted on the installation of lifts and other improvements at Monkhill Station with work scheduled to start later this year.

So far this year we have made some progress on the following Campaign Priorities.

#### **Baghill Station**

On 16 May we organised a meeting in St Giles' Church with an officer from the Arch Company, who are the owners of the station building, David Mather (City & Town Regeneration Officer, Wakefield MDC), Brian Mayhew



(South Ward Councillor), and Sean Stephens (owner of Southgate Business Centre & Pomfret Business Centre). This was to discuss the future of the building and to explore with the wider Pontefract community possible alternative uses. Arch are currently in the process of carrying out some repair work; in time they will circulate plans of the interior and will organise a site visit.



#### **Fitzwilliam Station**

Adoption schemes for all three stations – On 2 May we visited Fitzwilliam Station to see the work that their Station Adoption Group has achieved, which involves reporting issues to Northern Rail, and displaying community and schools' art in poster cases; something we may seek to emulate on a smaller scale in the years to come. As an aside, we also saw a hidden gem in a community centre, namely artefacts from the military museum which used to be housed at Cannon Hall. We are grateful to Morris Barrows for hosting us.













#### **Community Rail Partnership**

We have agreed that all three stations will join the Partnership, which should give us access to financial support to improve our stations, allowing us to involve the local community, local schools, New College and businesses in new projects, probably for 2024.

Our meetings will continue throughout the year and we are always keen to encourage more members with an interest in rail to join the Civic Society, and become active in our group's lobbying and campaigns.




